Ex Libris® Group is pleased to announce the introduction of a new Primo® component, Primo Central, which indexes scholarly materials such as articles and e-books provided by publishers and aggregators. Primo Central, seamlessly integrated into local Primo systems, will be managed by Ex Libris as a service available to all Primo customers. The beta release of Primo Central is planned for the end of 2009.

More than 180 leading academic and research institutions in 23 countries already benefit from the power of the Primo solution, installed locally or managed by Ex Libris as a service. Primo enables libraries to offer their users effective, branded discovery and delivery services that are fully customized to reflect local emphases and needs. Primo Central extends the power of Primo by providing users with seamless access to the entire library offering.
